

Waiting by Susan Roberts


Are you ready? Ready for what, I hear you ask. Ready for Jesus to come into your life and possibly cause chaos? The good news is that Jesus is coming. Christmas is on its way once again.

In the Christian year Advent, is a time of preparation and I'm not referring to the Christmas shopping or cooking, although that has its place! Years ago, Advent was a time of great solemnity, when Christians reflected on things such as life, death and judgement, but also of joy, because Jesus is not only our judge, but also our

saviour, who brings us the gift of eternal life and the Kingdom of God.

Advent carol services use the imagery of darkness into light by starting with the church in darkness and gradually adding more light until the building is fully illuminated to represent Christ as the light of the world coming to banish sin and darkness.

Although people may choose to ignore him, God has always been part of the world and he has always loved his creation and that means us.



If we believe Jesus' teaching, then we need to wait actively for his return and Advent is the time of year when we consider how actively we are waiting for Jesus' arrival. We are also waiting in hopeful expectation because we know that God will keep his promises.

I'm not good at waiting. My partner says that I always want everything done yesterday. Henri Nouwen wrote something about waiting that I find very helpful. He says that if you are waiting for something, you are on a road from somewhere and to somewhere, so no time spent waiting is ever wasted. I often have to remind myself of this.



I'm inclined to wait with eager, if slightly impatient expectation. Imagine a small child waiting at a station for a train. The child can't sit still and constantly goes to the station door and looks for the train. They talk excitedly to the other people waiting for the train. I hope I'm not that irritating, but the child's waiting is full of excitement and expectation. They are actively waiting.

Children wait for Father Christmas or Santa Claus to come. Santa Claus was originally St Nicholas, a Christian bishop who lived four hundred years after Jesus and used to give money to poor people to save them from slavery or starvation. On one

occasion he is supposed to have secretly filled some girls' stockings with gold so they would have a dowry and could be married.

Most of us will put up and decorate our Christmas trees and might find some cheerful lights to hang outside our homes to give a warm glow when we return to them.

We all wait for Jesus to be born again.

By the time you read this, we will have put our our crib. We have collected the figures over many years and even have two cats and a spaniel dog that join the animals in the stable!! On Christmas morning we will put the baby Jesus into his crib in the stable.

In spite of the challenges many people will have faced this year, Advent is a time to be filled with hope as we



begin our journey towards the birth of our saviour at Christmas, and as we reflect on God's love for us as part of his creation, I think we need to remember that we have choices to make about Jesus, and about how we live our lives. The question for us is: are we willing to be and become new creations in Christ? Let us try to be ready spiritually for the greatest gift of all, so that Jesus can have a straight road to our hearts when he is born again at Christmas.

May you all find some joy this Christmas.

Screening of new British documentary System Update – Rebooting Our Future

In collaboration with Perins School, New Leaf Alresford are hosting a screening of the film 'System Update – Rebooting Our Future' on Thursday 15th January. Join them to watch a bold new feature length documentary about climate change, exploring how we can transform our politics, economics and society to meet the climate crisis.

In an era of accelerating climate change and cascading impacts, *System Update* offers a vital look at how transformative shifts in politics, economics, and society, can protect people from climate catastrophe. This film calls for a reboot of outdated systems that have failed to respond to the climate crisis.

World-leading experts and change-makers explain why these systemic changes are critical, and how they can be achieved. The film is more than an informative documentary; it is a rallying cry for a better future one in which the majority of people are united in calling for the changes needed to avert disaster.

"We are on course for utterly catastrophic climate disaster within the lifetimes of younger generations," warns Professor Jason Hickel, who argues for a radical departure from current economic thinking in the film. This is contrasted with political leaders betting on untested technologies to reverse carbon emissions at some point in the future. *System Update* presents the reality: the time for action is <u>now</u>.

The film will be followed by a question and answer session with a panel, who will offer their perspectives on the challenges we face, as well as potential solutions. The panel will include the film's director Paul Maple, local MP Danny Chambers, and Denise Baden, Professor of Sustainable Practice at the University of Southampton.

The film will be shown using the new state of the art projection equipment in the Perins' Main Hall. Doors open at 6.30pm, the screening will start at 7pm, and the panel discussion will continue until 9pm.

The history of Christmas

The Bible does not give a date for the birth of Jesus. At first it was thought he was born around the same time of year as his death so they celebrated both events together and some modern research does suggest that it was in the Spring.

In the third century, however, it was suggested that Jesus was conceived at the Spring equinox, 25th March, popularising the belief that He was born nine months later on 25th December. John Chrysostom, the Archbishop of Constantinople, encouraged Christians worldwide to make Christmas a holy day in about 400.

In the early Middle Ages, Christians celebrated a series of midwinter holy days. Epiphany (which recalls the visit to the infant Jesus of the wise men bearing gifts) was the climax of 12 days of Christmas, beginning on 25th December, but the Christmas season continued until Candlemas on 2nd February. The Emperor Charlemagne chose 25th December for his coronation in 800, and the prominence of Christmas Day rose. In England, William the Conqueror also chose 25th December for his coronation in 1066, and the date became a fixture both for religious observance and feasting.





Cooking a boar was a common feature of mediaeval Christmas feasts, and singing carols accompanied it e.g' *The Boar's Head in Hand bear 1.* Writers of the time lament the fact that the true significance of Christmas was being lost because of partying. (Sounds familiar today!) They condemn the rise of 'misrule' – drunken dancing and promiscuity. The day was a public holiday, and traditions of bringing evergreen foliage into the house and the exchange of gifts (usually on Epiphany) date from this time.

In the 17th century the rise of new Protestant denominations led to a rejection of many celebrations that were associated

with Catholic Christianity. Christmas was one of them. After the execution of Charles I, England's Puritan rulers made the celebration of Christmas illegal for 14 years. The restoration of Charles II ended the ban, but religious leaders continued to discourage excess, especially in Scotland. In Western Europe (but not worldwide) the day for exchanging gifts changed from Epiphany (6th January) to Christmas Day.

By the 1820s, there was a sense that the significance of Christmas was declining. Charles Dickens was one of several writers who sought to restore it. His novel *A Christmas Carol* was significant in reviving merriment during the festival. He emphasised charity and family reunions, alongside religious observance. Christmas trees, paper chains, cards and many well-known carols date from this time. So did the tradition of Boxing Day, on 26th December, when tradesmen who had given reliable service during the year would collect 'boxes' of money or gifts from their customers.

In Europe Santa Claus is the figure associated with the bringing of gifts. Santa Claus is a shortening of the name of Saint Nicholas, who was a Christian bishop in the fourth century in present-day Turkey. He was particularly noted for his care for children and for his generosity to the poor. By the Middle Ages his appearance, in red bishop's robes and a mitre, was adored in the Netherlands and familiar across Europe.

Father Christmas dates from 17th century England, where he was a secular figure of good cheer (more associated with drunkenness than gifts). The transformation of Santa Claus into today's Father Christmas started in New York in the 1880s, where his red robes and white beard became potent advertising symbols. In some countries (such as Latin America and Eastern Europe) the tradition attempts to combine the secular and religious elements by holding that Santa Claus makes children's presents and then gives them to the baby Jesus to distribute.

Not every country believes that it's Father Christmas/Santa Claus who brings the presents. Other countries have other traditions. In Austria it is the Christ Child who fills children's shoes with good things and in Italy children eagerly await the arrival of the Three Kings with their presents as two thousand plus years ago they brought presents to Jesus.

When Twelfth night falls in February

It was Sunday January 19th and we found ourselves in Salisbury on the Sunday morning. As we walked up the south aisle of the church we could hardly miss the Christmas Tree, beautifully decorated and making a very clear statement about the season. Yes, it was Christmas even on January 19.

Where we live most outside Christmas decorations don't even make it to Twelfth Night, the Feast of the Epiphany when traditionally most people took down their Christmas decorations. "Christmas" runs from mid December to the end of the New Year in many households. So it is refreshing to find churches where Christmas lasts much longer.





The Christian Year is orientated around the great major Festivals. A period of preparation, Advent, leads to the Christmas Festival which lasts throughout the season of Epiphany as well and comes to a dramatic end at Candlemas on February 2nd. That is the time when the Christmas trees should get put away and the crib sets is put away for another year.

Not long afterwards the second period starts with Ash Wednesday and Lent as we prepare to keep the great season of Easter – the 50 days that take us from Easter right through to Pentecost (what used to be called WhitSunday). Pentecost and the Sunday after (Trinity) start a new season which lasts for much of the rest of the year.

What is the point of all of this? This structure encourages us to explore a balanced picture of the Christian faith, giving weight to the coming among us of God as a human being, the suffering and resurrection of Jesus, and then the ordinary daily life of the church under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. Balance is an important issue – history is full of calamities caused by people of faith who got things "out of balance".

It's good that some give Christmas good measure. A good way to approach the "dark days of January" **Ceolfrid**





St John's Church Clock

St John's church tower clock mechanism has been completely removed for refurbishment by Smith of Derby, a well-known clock maker and repairer,

at a cost of £5,895 + VAT.

Pic 1 shows the space on right side, from where the clock mechanism was removed from the frame. The mechanism on the left is for the hour chimes, which was refurbished several years ago.

The original gravity powered clock was installed in 1811. The clock face is original, but was refurbished over three years ago.

Pic 2 clock face after refurbishment, with me making the final inspection.

Originally, the clock was gravity powered by a heavy weight (often a large stone) suspended by a rope. When the stone reached the full extent of its downward travel it would be wound back up by a designated person, called "the clock winder". Pic 3.

In 1949 the church mechanism was electrified. The long rope and stone were replaced by a metal weight and bicycle type chain with a much shorter fall of about 12inches. At the bottom of its travel the weight is wound back by an electric motor, thus dispensing with the clock winder. The installation was paid for by Elizabeth Frances Culley in memory of her two sons.

Pics 5 and 6 show the front and rear of the removed clock mechanism.

Unfortunately, the clock will be stopped for up to three months.

Christmas Fun Facts

Christmas trees



- Even before the time of Christ, evergreen trees were seen in winter as a symbol of fertility.
- It was the 16th century monk, Martin Luther, who is credited with the idea of having lights on Christmas trees. He added candles to his tree, to look like stars in a forest.
- Windsor Castle got its first Christmas tree in 1800, brought by Charlotte, wife of George III.
- It was in 1835 that the term 'Christmas tree' was first used in English.
- It was in the 1840s, when Prince Albert, consort of Queen Victoria, began bringing trees inside, that led to their popularity throughout the UK.
- It was Woolworths who first sold manufactured Christmas tree ornaments back in 1880.
- The tree in London's Trafalgar Square has been a gift from the city of Oslo, Norway since 1947.
- The world's tallest Xmas tree, at 221ft high, was erected in a Washington shopping mall in 1950.
- In a survey of the nation's favourite smells, real Christmas trees came eighth, just behind the sea, but ahead of perfume.



Mistletoe's smelly history

Did you know that the word 'mistletoe' means dung on a tree? The Anglo-Saxons thought that mistletoe grew in trees where birds had left their droppings. Mistel means dung, and tan means twig.

The story of mince pies

Did you know that mince pies have been traditional English Christmas fare since the Middle Ages, when meat was a key ingredient? The addition of spices, suet and alcohol to meat came about because it was an alternative to salting and smoking in order to preserve the food. Mince pies used to be a different shape - cradle-shaped with a pastry baby Jesus on top. You are supposed to eat one mince pie on each of the twelve days of Christmas to ensure the next twelve months are happy.



Robins and Christmas



Long ago in Palestine a little brown bird flew into a dark, cold, smelly stable to find a place to rest.

Outside on the high mountain there was a snow storm with a fierce bitter wind. The bird was tired with battling the wind so he flew in and settled on a rafter.

In the stable he found a young couple trying to keep a new born baby warm. He was lying in the hay and they had covered him with a cloak but still the infant cried as he wasn't warm enough.

The innkeeper stood nearby. "We have no more blankets," she said, "our inn is so full."

The bird knew how hard it was to raise youngsters. He had struggled to keep his own hatchlings safe last spring. He flew down from the rafter and settled his warm body on the baby fluffing out his feathers as he had for his own babies.

The baby stopped crying, sighed, closed his eyes and went to sleep. All that night the bird warmed the child.

The parents were thankful and blessed the loving bird who blushed from their praise.

In between sitting and warming the babe he flew round the meagre fire flapping his wings to make it glow hotter and bringing twigs he found to feed it even though sparks burnt his breast.

All night he flew from warming the baby to feeding the fire.

At last morning came —the sun rose and the wind dropped so the stable was a bit warmer and the bird could rest. As he settled on his rafter to sleep he was no long just brown as his breast and face were colour of the fire he had tended—a reminder of the warmth he had given the Christ child to help him survive his first night.



THE CHRISTMAS MAIL

Robins are often seen on Christmas cards partly because of the legend above but also because postmen and postwomen wear red jackets and so were often called 'Robin Redbreasts' Left is one early Christmas card showing a robin delivering a card.



Robins: Facts and Figures

• Robins are the UK's favourite bird. Thanks to its bright red breast, it's familiar throughout the year and especially at Christmas. Males and females look identical, young birds have no red breast and are spotted with golden brown. Robins sing nearly all year round and despite their cute appearance, they are aggressively territorial and are quick to drive away other robins that intrude on their territory. They will sing at night next to street lights.



- Robins are one of the very few birds that sing throughout the year though rather less in July and August when they are moulting (shedding old feathers to make way for new ones to grow). Robins like to sing from a perch, whether that be a fence post, a tree branch or the handle of your garden spade. They can be seen almost anywhere around the UK, in gardens, parks and cities. Unlike most other birds both male and female robins sing.
- Robins often follow gardeners so that they can grab any bugs or worms dug up. They can become quite friendly.
- Robins' nests have been found in plant pots, car bonnets, in a plane engine and apparently even in a (deceased) human skull! Despite their placid behaviour around people, male Robins are extremely territorial, defending their patch sometimes until death. They'll lay around four or five eggs and have two or three clutches throughout the spring and summer months.
- Robins eat a wide variety of food: seeds, fruit, worms, insects and other bugs.
- The robins in the UK are a European bird and is a kind of flycatcher. The American robin is a different species and is a kind of thrush







Just to remind you the collection bin at St John's is outside the Parish Office.



I decided to have a go, but then hit the first dilemma – how to order the right shade on line?



Rory Investigates St. Nicholas





Every year since I have come to live in Alresford, I have woken up on Christmas morning with a little present in a stocking at the end of my basket. I know I didn't put them there – so who did? My clever friend (Carrot the ginger cat) says it was Santa Paws, but I think he meant Santa Claus (I'm not too sure – I only bark a smattering of cat). I wanted to find out some more about this mysterious, benevolent gentleman, so I have tried to sniff out some facts.

Santa Claus seems to be the modern incarnation of a person called St. Nicholas, who was probably alive sometime between 270 – 343 AD and from Turkey (the country, not the obese chicken). He was a bishop, a good man who was credited with many miracles as well as for helping people. He seems to be the patron saint (bit like a spokesman in Heaven) for all these things: sailors, merchants, archers, repentant thieves, children, brewers, pawnbrokers, toymakers, unmarried people, and students. He also had a reputation for secret gift-giving.

Some of the good things he is said to have done are:

- rescuing 3 girls from being forced into misery by dropping a sack of gold coins through the window of their house each night for 3 nights, so their father could pay a dowry for each of them;
- calming a storm at sea;
- saving 3 innocent soldiers from wrongful execution;
- chopping down a tree possessed by a demon;
- resurrecting 3 children, who had been murdered and pickled by a butcher planning to sell them as sausages.

So, generally a nice fellow, who tends to rescue groups of 3. It looks like he began his regeneration into our Santa Claus via Dutch traditions, where "St Nicholas" is known as "Sinterklaas", from where the legend spread into North America when Dutch settlers took up residence in New York. The 1823 American poem "A Visit from St. Nicholas" (author uncertain), describes St. Nick arriving at the author's home on Christmas Eve in a sleigh pulled by flying reindeer. The poem laid the foundation for modern depictions of Santa Claus and the association between Santa Claus and Christmas. Interestingly, Rudolph and his odd nasal affliction don't get a mention – the antlered lads accompanying our hero are named as Dasher, Dancer, Prancer, Vixen, Comet, Cupid, Donner and Blitzen. Rudolph first made his appearance in 1939 in the story "Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer" by Robert L. May, followed 10 years later by the jaunty song of the same name.

Father Christmas as we tend to know him today dates to 16th-century England during the reign of Henry VIII (a less-jolly bearded fat man), when he was pictured as a large man in green or scarlet robes lined with fur. He stood for the spirit of good cheer at Christmas, bringing peace, joy, good food and wine and revelry. When England no longer kept the feast day of Saint Nicholas on 6 December (although his day is still celebrated in other countries), the Father Christmas celebration was moved to 25 December to coincide with Christmas Day. The Victorians' comprehensive revival of Christmas included Father Christmas as the emblem of good cheer.

Along with his tireless and dedicated staff of elves, magically-flying reindeer, and buoyed-up by the many mince pies and warming drinks left for him by fireplaces the world over (which, frankly, won't help his expanding waistline - no wonder they needed to draft in Rudolph for additional support), St. Nick in whichever form he takes continues to spread festive joy, cheer and sparkle to all who welcome him in. Including me.



One of my late predecessors, in his "Around the World with Jasper" series on his dog-blog, once visited Santa when he stopped off in Rovaniemi, in Finnish Lapland. There, he discovered that it was not magic that flew the reindeer through the skies, but propulsion by gaseous emissions after an especially enthusiastic sprout-supper, prepared for the purpose by the elves.

Don't forget St Joseph!

The traditional Nativity scene on our Christmas cards has Mary with the Holy Babe. Around her are the shepherds and Magi. We may also see stable animals, angels and a star! While Joseph is often included, his presence seems to be of minor importance.

After all, we praise God for Jesus with our familiar Christmas carols, mentioning angels, shepherds, Wise Men and Mary but the name of Joseph is absent! Why is Joseph given a low profile? For he is a man to be remembered.



Joseph was a resident of Nazareth. He worked as a carpenter/builder and his skills would have included making furniture, repairing buildings and crafting agricultural tools. Although Joseph had an honourable profession, he would not have been a man of great wealth.

The gospel writers Matthew and Luke give Joseph a few brief mentions. After the birth of Jesus, Joseph and Mary go to the temple in Jerusalem to dedicate the Baby to God. Afterwards, they flee into Egypt to escape the wrath of Herod and much later return to Nazareth—probably joining their relatives who lived and worked there. Twelve years later, Mary and Joseph go with Jesus to Jerusalem for the Passover feast. Here they lose Jesus, only to find Him in the Temple talking with religious leaders!



Apart from these verses, the New Testament is silent about the rest of Joseph's life. However, we do know that Joseph was father to other children by Mary. His four sons are named, and they had at least two daughters. (See Matthew 13:55)

And we also know that Joseph was someone who quietly and humbly took on the awesome role in caring for the early life of the Son of God. Joseph would have taught Jesus many things – not just the skills of a labourer, but the lore of the countryside which was evident in our Lord's teaching. Jesus grew up within a loving family and described God as 'Father', knowing also the good fatherly qualities of Joseph.

In the Christmas story, Joseph is placed into a situation that brought him misunderstanding and suspicion. But Joseph remained faithful in the knowledge that as long as God had spoken, the opinion of others mattered little.

Before Jesus began His ministry, it is believed that Joseph died. It is likely Jesus took on many of His father's responsibilities before He left home which is why he did not begin his ministry until he was thirty—he had to see his younger brothers apprenticed and his younger sisters married. It also explains why Jesus almost certainly did not marry as he could not take on more responsibilities.

In the eyes of the world, Joseph was a nobody. He was not a man of valour, fame and fortune. But he was the one who had parental responsibility for the greatest person who has ever lived!

It is sad that we often equate ordinariness with ineffectiveness. Down the ages, God has used many ordinary people to accomplish great things. God continues to use ordinary people. Like Joseph, we need to know that doing God's will is the most important thing in life. May we, this Christmas, respond to God's call to us and please Him in all that we do.



The Incarnation 1 A reflection Jesus's humanity

My frame was not hidden from you when I was made in the secret place, when I was woven together in the depths of the earth.

Your eyes saw my unformed body; all the days ordained for me were written in your book

before one of them came to be. Psalm 139:15-16

You began life as a single cell. For a few hours you were a miniscule but highly complex blob of jelly, until it began to divide: two cells, four, eight, sixteen, a ball, a hollow ball, and then something more recognisably like a living organism. You were still tiny, but developing a nervous system, a head, a body, arms and legs. A typical embryo as seen on the right.

Until recently I hadn't thought much about Jesus being an embryo. Somehow, I find that thought even more shocking than His birth. How could God, who made the universe, have become something so completely and utterly vulnerable? Maybe in the past, when the development of a child happened in 'secret', it was possible just to let that part of the Christmas story go untold.

Today, when we see images of a developing child, or even embryos outside the womb, it is harder to ignore the process of Jesus developing into a baby. The incarnation meant that God's Son went through all the stages in the diagram in my developmental biology textbook. If he was (and is) fully human that meant he had all the normal processes of human life: birth, growth, hunger, sweat, shivering, got tired and so on. And being human he made mistakes and his knowledge was limited for example he did not know where Lazarus's tomb was and he explicitly stated he did not know when the second coming would happen. To deny Jesus's humanity is one of the heresies as much as to deny his

Jesus was there in the beginning, and all life owes its existence to Him. But instead of remaining aloof, He

chose to become one of us. The Son of God shared the same kind of DNA as every other organism on the planet. He knows what it feels like to have a body, to feel hungry and thirsty, pain and pleasure, dark and light. As St Paul states he set aside his divinity in order to be one of us. He set it aside but it was still there.

In Psalm 139, the writer is meditating on God's intimate knowledge of him, which began when he was an embryo. There is nothing God doesn't know about him, and even darkness cannot obscure him from God's sight. The incarnation means that God's intimacy with us now extends even further. He became one of us, lived alongside us, and shared our very fragile material nature.

The transcendent God is also immanent, longing for us to relate to Him as Father. He became as fragile as we are so He could rescue us from the messes we so often find ourselves in. With His help, we can remember what it means to be fearfully and wonderfully made.



The Incarnation 2

A reflection on Jesus's divinity.

He looked to all who knew him like an ordinary man. He was born a baby—beginning as one cell. He grew, he ate, he felt pain and yet he was not only human but divine. He was God in human form and He never stopped being God. As stated on the previous page Jesus was fully human (and still is—he did not set aside his humanity when he ascended into heaven).

And yet every so often in his earthly life some of his divinity showed through. Of course we think of the miracles—the healing, the calming of the storm, the water into wine and so on. But also consider the sort of person he was: yes he got angry, he got tired but again and again he showed love, compassion and forgiveness when most people would have shown rage or hatred. Very few people enduring what he endured could say, "Father forgive them for they know not what they do."



I think his divinity also shines through in his understanding of people and how they are driven to behave, and the acceptance that that understanding led to.

He spoke with authority and had a close relationship with the Father. He came from a Jewish background and had had the sort of training that any perceptive Jewish boy had—possibly even full rabbinical training as some of his enemies call him rabbi. Yet he is different in his approach to God—blasphemously so in Jewish eyes. He reads and understands scriptures in new and to his audience amazing ways. The verses in Isaiah that we call the Servant Songs had always been seen as about Israel but Jesus speaks of them as about the Messiah—about himself.

And he knew he was different. He speaks of himself as divine. An even greater blasphemy to his contemporaries. Jesus said to them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, before Abraham was, I am." So they picked up stones to throw at him, but Jesus hid himself and went out of the temple. They picked up stone because by that statement he had said he was God. For the phrase 'I am' is how God answered Moses when the latter asked whom he was speaking to. The punishment for blasphemy was stoning.

In saying this Jesus has to be one of three things; a liar or fantasist, a madman or God. There is no evidence he was mad and he certainly didn't lie so that means he is God.

To deny Jesus's divinity is another heresy that the early church battled against and it is still a problem today. It stretches our reason and imagination to think of him as God. We do not, cannot, understand it. Nor can we understand how one person can be both human and divine—those two states are contradictory. God is eternal, infinite, omniscient, omnipotent. Humans are bound by time, finite, limited and weak.



In the end it is a teaching we just have to accept. We will never fully understand it at least not in this life—maybe in the life to come perhaps.

The Real Wenceslas



The real Wenceslas — known as Václav the Good — lived from about A.D. 907 to 929, and the story of his brief 22 years on this earth featured family treachery rather than love.

His father, Vratislaus I, was the Duke of Bohemia and a Christian. His mother, Drahomíra, though baptized before the marriage, was aligned with Bohemia's pagans. As a child, Václav was raised largely by his Christian paternal grandmother, Ludmila — who was lat-

er canonized as a saint in her own right.

When Václav was about 13, his father died in battle and Ludmila became regent. But the regency did not last long. His mother had Ludmila killed — resenting her mother-in-law's influence on the government and her soon-to-be duke son. Newly empowered, Drahomíra also sought to suppress Bohemia's Christians.

When Václav became Duke of Bohemia himself at age 18, he instead sought to spread Christianity. He banished his mother because she was pagan (there is also some evidence that she was rather unkind to him) He commissioned the building of several churches including part of what is now St. Vitus Cathedral in Prague. He also developed a reputation as a wise and compassionate ruler, known for his deeds of mercy.

Legend has it that he paid particular attention to caring for the poor, widows, orphans and even prisoners. He opposed the slave market and would buy slaves in order to set them free. He also is known for successfully negotiating peace with the Bavarians, who had been traditional enemies of Bohemians.

But his jealous younger brother, Boleslav, wanted to become duke himself and had the backing of their mother. Boleslav also was willing to exploit his brother's faith to seize power. He invited Václav to a church dedication on Sept. 27, 929. The next day, while Václav was on his way to prayer, Boleslav and his henchman attacked — killing the young duke on Sept. 28.

Soon after his death, Václav's tomb at St. Vitus became a popular site for pilgrimage, and through many shifts in what powers ruled the region, he remained a hero to the Czech people. To this day, he is still a familiar sight to many Czechs.

For nearly 100 years, a large statue of him as an armed knight on horseback has stood proudly in Prague's Wenceslas Square. Václav's feast day of Sept. 28 is also a national holiday that celebrates Czech statehood.

The carol we sing today was written nearly a thousand years after his death and is supposed to be based on a legend..

Singapore-Style Egg Noodles

Is your palate feeling a bit jaded by all the Christmas fare and leftovers? Here's something quick, tasty and easy to try that is a refreshing distance from sprouts and turkey. The recipe below should take around 25 minutes to prepare and cook and should serve 4.

Ingredients

200g dried medium egg noodles
4 eggs
1 tbsp dark soy sauce, plus extra to serve
Vegetable oil or cooking spray
700g ready-prepared stir-fry vegetables
1 garlic clove, thinly sliced
1 small red onion, cut into thin wedges
2 tsp medium curry powder
215g cooked peeled prawns, defrosted if frozen



Method

Cook the noodles according to the packet instructions. Rinse in a sieve under cold running water, then set aside.

Crack the eggs into a bowl and beat with the soy sauce until smooth. Coat a non-stick frying pan with vegetable oil or cooking spray and place over a medium heat. Pour in the eggs and cook for 2 minutes without stirring, then set aside to cool slightly. Remove from the pan and cut into long, thin strips.

Spray a large non-stick frying pan or wok with cooking spray (or coat thinly with vegetable oil) and place over a medium-high heat. Add the stir-fry vegetables, garlic and onion and stir-fry for 2 minutes. Spray with a little more low-calorie cooking spray (or add more vegetable oil if needed), sprinkle with the curry powder and stir-fry for 2-3 minutes.

Add the prawns, omelette strips and noodles to the pan and toss with the veg until the prawns are heated through. Divide between bowls and serve with extra soy sauce to taste for seasoning.

For a sprinkle of fairy-dust try:

This is equally delicious if cooked with tofu, Quorn or chicken pieces instead of the prawns. Do make sure that they are thoroughly cooked through before serving though!




